Study Results for Narcolepsy Familial Risk

- Mignot (Neurology 1992): 1-2% of subjects with narcolepsy have an affected kindred (vertical or horizontal)
 - >99% chance **not to** transmit
- Ohayon (J Sleep Res 2005): 7% of 157 Italian subjects with narcolepsy (phone survey) probands have symptoms.
 - Parent-child transmission 4%
 - 96% chance **not to** transmit symptoms
- Salpêtrière series: 4 parent-child family in 673 subjects with narcolepsy
 - 99.9% chance **not to** transmit

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Will I Transmit My Disorder?

Narcolepsy: no

Idiopathic Hypersomnia: no reliable information
